About the Artwork

Kerrie Kenton, *Connecting Culture*, 2013, Acrylic on canvas and mixed media 90cm x 90cm.

Aboriginal teacher, Clarence Bruinsma, who was at Asquith Girls High and the team at Hornsby Council, came up with a plan to get together Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students in the area for a day of learning about culture and art. Invitations were sent out to the schools and 22 students and their teachers attended the workshop at Wallarobba Arts and Culture Centre in Hornsby with acclaimed Aboriginal artist Kerrie Kenton. Kerrie took them on a journey about their Aboriginality which was beautifully portrayed in the artworks they produced. The works were hung by Kerrie as an exhibition in NAIDOC week in Hornsby library. The centrepiece of the exhibition was *Connecting Culture*, created by Kerrie using the handprints of the students who participated in the wonderful day of sharing stories, art, winter sunshine and laughter.

This artwork is about the coming together of all of us. Gathering in Hornsby at Wallarobba Arts and Cultural Centre. To share and learn about our art and culture. To embrace this knowledge. To mark the launch of the Guringai Festival, Willoughby Council and the Councillors of Willoughby City with The Guringai Festival Committee invite you to join them to view this stunning exhibition by photographer, Aletheia Casey.

The forcible removal of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children from their families throughout the 1900s is arguably one of the worst atrocities of the 20th century in Australia.

These children have become known as The Stolen Generations.

In February 2008 the former Prime Minister Kevin Rudd formally apologised for the past mistreatment of Australia's First Peoples and for past Governments' wrong doings and the '...profound grief, suffering and loss' which was caused by the forcible removal of these children.

This body of photographic work explores the historical consequences of past government's actions and the more recent effect of the Australian Government's formal apology.

This series, which is an-depth exploration into the themes of grief, loss and healing, pairs together memory landscapes with portraits to create a body of work which gives a post-apology voice to women who are survivors of past government's policies.

National Sorry Day is an annual event that has been held in Australia on 26 May, since 1998, to remember and commemorate the mistreatment of Australia's First Peoples.

This year we are putting the spotlight on Stolen Generations trauma recovery and how people affected can find a sense of wellness and wellbeing.

For the first time, a one day event will be held to look at the best way to support survivors and their families who have experienced trauma as a result of being removed from their families, communities and culture, due to former government policies.

Discussion sessions will focus on questions such as:

- Was the National Apology enough?
- What is intergenerational trauma?
- What does recovery look like?
- How can Australia's First People wellness philosophies and concepts, inform mainstream services?
